11. **Trade Policy development (TBT/SPS/Anti dumping etc.):** (1) Import of live pigs and pork products into Bhutan has been banned w.e.f. 27 July 2022 to prevent introduction of African Swine Fever (ASF).

Based on request from APEDA, Mission has been following up with Bhutan government authorities to permit import of pork products from M/s Mayur Piggery Farm located in Pune, along with documentary evidence to prove that there are no reports of ASF in pigs from M/s Mayur Piggery Farm.

(2) The Royal Government of Bhutan has banned the conduct of consumer trade fairs and general fairs that involve external parties and imported goods with effect from 23.12.2022. Only thematic fairs meant for promoting local goods and services and for export purposes will be allowed with prior approval from the Royal Government of Bhutan.

### 13. Development -

### INTERNAL

1. The 5th Bhutan-India High Impact Community Development Project Committee (HICDP) Meeting was held on 28<sup>th</sup> February in Thimphu. The Committee reviewed progress of 524 Projects being implemented across 20 Dzongkhags and 4 Thromdes in Bhutan. INR./Nu. 8.5 billion has been earmarked for implementation of High Impact Community Development Projects (HICDPs) in the 12<sup>th</sup> FYP.

2. 25<sup>th</sup> February 2023: Government of India has extended a grant assistance of INR/Nu 2 billion for the Gyalsung Infra Project. This grant assistance will be used for the De-suung for Gyalung program as a special India-Bhutan Friendship Project. H.E. Sudhakar Dalela, Ambassador of India, presented the first tranche of grant assistance of INR 1 billion to the Project Director of Gyalsung Infra.

3. 20.02.2023: The overall unemployment rate for Bhutan in 2022 is estimated at 5.9 percent which is an increase by 1.1 percent as compared to 4.8 percent in 2021. According to the report, the first high unemployment rate of 5.0% was observed in 2020, which could be attributed to COVID-19 pandemic where it has greatly reduced the employment opportunities for those unemployed as the businesses and service sectors remained closed. It was further aggravated by the oversea returnees and those laid off employees by the affected sectors

4. 17.02.2023: The ministry of finance (MoF) imposed a moratorium on import of selected vehicles on August 18, 2022. The existing moratorium on the import of vehicles extended by six months from 18th February to 18th August, 2023. In order to uphold the Constitutional provision of maintaining a minimum foreign exchange reserve adequate to meet the cost of not less than one year's essential import .

5. 09.02.2023: Revised Food and Nutrition Security Policy to be implemented in 13<sup>th</sup> FYP. If everything goes as planned, the agriculture and livestock sectors could contribute about 8% of the country's GDP annually. Currently, the sector contributes only about 3% of GDP growth rate.

6. 07.02.2023: The Royal Government of Bhutan's Ministry of Finance (MoF) forecasts that this year, the country's economy will expand on average by 5% over the medium term. The recovery in services, manufacturing, and hydropower will be the main drivers of the growth.

7. 07.02.2023: Druk Green Power Corporation (DGPC) has asked for a loan from the Power Finance Corporation (PFC), Rural Electrification Corporation (REC), and other financial institutions of India to finance 600MW Kholongchhu Hydro Energy Limited (KHEL). Nu 4.5B was spent on the project so far. The project's total cost is estimated at Nu 54.4B at the 2020 price level. The first joint-venture hydropower company, KHEL, is now dropped.

8. 06.02.2023: The Ministry of Finance, Royal Government of Bhutan is projecting a budget outlay of Nu 72 billion for the fiscal year 2023–2024. Nu 41 billion of the total estimated budget will be used for recurrent costs, and the remaining Nu will be used for capital budget.

9. 06.02.2023: Bhutan will need to import 500 MU of winter electricity this year, double the amount imported last year, and the cost of imports could be around Nu 1.6 billion based on consumption in January

2023, as Bhutan continues to witness an increase in energy needs. In January 2023, the country purchased 88 MU of power from the Indian Energy Exchange (IEX) at the cost of Nu 292 million (mn), which is Nu 3.3 per unit of electricity.

10. The 40-bedded Jigme Dorji Wangchuck Military Hospital (JDMH) in Dewathang, Samdrupjongkhar was inaugurated on 5<sup>th</sup> February, 2023 by Finance Minister of Bhutan. The ceremony was also attended by Deputy Chief of Mission, Embassy of India, Thimphu. The new hospital will benefit the two neighbouring districts of Trashigang and Pemagatshel. The project was initiated in 2016 with a budgetary support of Nu 511 M from the Government of India.

11. Bhutan received Indian rupees (Rs) 2,400 crore in aid from India's Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman's Union Budget declaration on February 1, 2023, a slight increase from last year's Rs 2,266 crore. This accounts for 41.04% of development assistance provided by India's Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) and is the highest among other countries.

12. The Government of India is supporting the Royal Government of Bhutan with the establishment of a third international internet gateway, an optical fibre backbone, and a peering arrangement between India's National Knowledge Network (NKN) and Bhutan's Druk Research and EducationNetwork (DrukREN). India is also contributing Nu 1.98 billion to support Bhutan's digital transformation through several people-centric projects.

13. February 01 2023: As of December 2022, Bhutan's external hydro power debt has increased compared to that of September, 2022. The debt stood at Nu 164.4bn constituting 69.2% of the total external debt and 80.1% of the Fiscal Year (FY) 2022-23 Gross Domestic Product (GDP) estimate. The hydro debt comprises the debt stock of six hydro-power projects.

14. 3<sup>rd</sup> February 2023: With 87.75% of the project completed, the 118<sup>th</sup> MW Nikachhu Hydropower Project in Trongsa is expected to commission by December this year. The cost of the project is likely to increase to Nu. 13Billion. The tarrif as per Power Purchase Agreement with Power Trading Company India Ltd is Nu. 330/Kwh.
