13. Development -

- 1. Ambassador inaugurated the India Pavilion at the 11th Bhutan Construction & Wood Expo on architecture, building, construction & design which was held from 14 17 October, 2022 in Thimphu. He interacted with over 60 Indian and Bhutanese companies at the Expo and discussed ways to strengthen bilateral economic cooperation.
- 2. During the virtual meet the press on 14 October, the Prime Minister of Bhutan said that the main strategy to protect Bhutan's convertible currency reserves is to obtain loans from international financial institutions and bilateral partners, He added that the best projects in Bhutan are renewable energy projects such as solar power and small and medium hydropower.
- 3. Responding to concerns surrounding depleting foreign reserve, Prime Minister of Bhutan (Dr.) Lotay Tshering told the press on 14 October 2022 that there are still around USD 850 million as reserve against the requirement of USD 668 million. Lyonchhen said while the current reserve is not a comfort, the reserve is still on the positive side. The moratorium on vehicle import and the reopening to tourism have also helped maintaining the reserve. According to Lyonchhen, if the situation does not improve, import ban on non essentials will also be implemented.
- 4. Between September 5 and October 25 this year, 2,571 metric tonnes (MT) potatoes (worth INR 6.3 crore) and 917 MT of other vegetables (worth INR 1 crore) were exported to India, for which INR 8.5 crore were received. Pursuant to Article 24 of the Foreign Exchange Regulation 2020 (FERR), Bhutanese exporters have been issued an RMA directive that from September 5 this year, all receipts with respect to trade in goods with residents of India must be received in Indian rupees through official banking channels.
- 5. Jaigaon's parity rate between Ngultrum and INR has reached about 7% to Nu, meaning that Nu 107 is equivalent to about INR 100.
- 6. Anyone entering or leaving the pedestrian terminal at Phuentsholing will be charged a nominal fee of Nu 10 per person with effect from November 01. The fee will be applied each time a person enters or leaves the country. This fee is for the maintenance and upkeep of the terminal. This applies to both Bhutanese and foreigners.
- 7. Union Finance Minister of India Smt. Nirmala Sitharaman and Finance Minister of Bhutan Lyonpo Namgay Tshering met on the sidelines of the IMF-WB Annual Meetings in Washington DC on 12 October 2022. They discussed bilateral development and cooperation issues including hydro power and Covid assistance. Lyonpo Namgay Tshering expressed gratitude to GoI for providing assistance in implementing Bhutan's 12th Five Year Plan and the additional USD 200 million currency swap arrangement. He also thanked India for the BHIM UPI App and RuPay rollout already done in Bhutan.
- 8. The Sustainable Development Fee (SDF), which was earlier applicable only for foreign tourists, is now applicable to all international travellers visiting Bhutan including potential FDI investors during feasibility visits; participants of MICE (meetings, incentives, conferences & exhibitions); journalists & media personnel; official guests of government, civil society, religious organizations, corporations, etc. Certain categories are exempted such as expatriate traders holding a valid business license and trader card and their direct dependents.
- 9. Bhutan is now open to international tourism without quarantine from 23 September 2022. 737 tourists arrived in the country from 23-30 September 2022. 183 tourists who arrived in Bhutan are paying the full USD 200 Sustainable Development Fee (SDF), with 384 guests paying the old SDF of USD 65, and 170 guests (Indian nationals) paying the SDF of Nu 1,200.
- 10. Re-opening of Bhutan's border gates has spurred economic activities in the southern districts of Bhutan, including in Phuentsholing, Nganglam, Samtse, Gelephu. At the same time, many people from Bhutan are crossing over to the Indian side to shop for goods, as these are comparatively cheaper.
- 11. Despite the central bank's initiative to improve remittance inflow from Bhutanese living abroad, the first six months this year saw a decrease in remittance inflow by about 30 percent compared to the same period last year. Bhutan

received remittance of Rs. 283 crore, equivalent to USD 38.12 million, in the first half of this year, a decrease of Rs. 122 billion. During the same period last year, the remittance received was Rs. 403 crore, equivalent to USD 54.72 million.

- 12. GoI has allowed the import of 17,000 MT of green (raw) areca nut from Bhutan every year without the minimum import price condition. However, local media have noted that this trade is permitted only via Jaigaon Land Customs Station (implying that Bhutanese farmers / traders based in other regions, such as Samtse, would need to come via Phuentsholing/Jaigaon to export areca nut to India).
- 13. The overall hydropower generation of the Druk Green Power Corporation (DGPC) power plants Tala, Chhukha, Kurichhu, and Basochhu is expected to decrease by over 4 percent this year projected at 6,947.27 million units (MU), compared to last year's hydropower generation recorded at 7,249.35 MU. The generation forecast is mainly based on trends in hydrological flows and actual generation at each of the power plants.
- 14. According to the September 2022 CPI Bulletin released by the National Bureau of Statistics (NSB) on 31 October 2022, the prices of consumer goods and services increased by 6.05% in September 2022 compared to the same month last year.

EXTERAL

- 1. ADB approved a US\$37.35 million (M) policy-based loan (about Rs. 300 crore) to support Bhutan's green and resilient economic recovery from the Covid-19 pandemic. The loan will finance the first sub-program of the fiscal sustainability and green recovery program.
- 2. ADB also approved US\$18.26 million in additional funding for construction of the first utility-scale solar power plant on October 19. The power plant, with a total capacity of more than 17.38 megawatts, will be built in midwestern Bhutan. Annual power generation is expected to be 25 gigawatt hours.
- 3. The Government of Japan's support of US\$1,497,471 (Nu. 119.7M) is utilized in the procurement and installation of cold chain equipment. Cold chain is the backbone of the immunization programme, and a high quality cold chain allows health workers to deliver life-saving vaccines to every child. This was handed over to the Ministry of Health, on 26th October in Thimphu.
